Easter 2024 A Message from Bishop Laurie
AN INCOMPLETE SENTENCE Mark 16:8

Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed. Alleluia!

The gospel of Mark begins with this verse, Mark 1:1, The beginning of the good news [a] of Jesus Christ. Then it ends with an incomplete sentence 1 . Mark's Easter Story ends with an incomplete sentence. What was the editor thinking? Where are the punctuation police when you need them? Look at it for yourself. Mark 16:8 in Greek και ἐξεληθούσαι ἔφυγον ἀπὸ τοῦ μνημείου, εἶχεν [f] γὰρ αὐτὰς τρόμος καὶ ἔκστασις· καὶ οὐδενὶ οὐδὲν εἶπαν, ἐφοβοῦντο γάρ



See, it ends with the word “gar” which can be translated “for or because.” Why did the writer of Mark end the gospel with the word “because?” Word-for-word the last part of the verse reads to none nothing they spoke they were afraid because.

So just to be clear, the purpose of the gospel of Mark is to tell the good news of Jesus Christ and then it ends with an empty tomb and the only witnesses to it run away in fear saying nothing to anyone because...

It should be noted there is no punctuation in the original Greek and we can of course rearrange the English words and make a sentence, but still the incompleteness of the Greek sentence, abrupt ending and the incompleteness of story itself are telling. 2

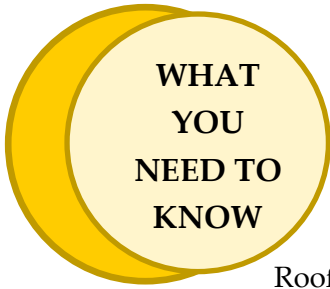
Matthew, Luke and John end their Easter story with Jesus appearing to the disciples after the resurrection. These gospels end with proof of the resurrection that others see with their own eyes and some even touch Jesus. Mark has no proof of the resurrection. He doesn't even finish his last sentence.

Mark 1 was intended to be just the beginning of the story of the good news of Jesus. It can't be completely recorded with paper and pen because it is still being written in the lives of the believers today. Friends, the story of Easter didn't end with the frightened women. If it did we wouldn't be here today. Some of Mark's Easter story will be written by your life, my life, our witness to the empty tomb and the transforming power of God love in our life. The rest of the story will be written by those who come after us and whose lives bear witness to God's power to transform death to life. We are proof of the resurrection. Our lives transformed by the power of God's love and forgiveness are proof that Jesus rose from the dead. We are writing new verses and chapters for Mark's gospel, so that the next generation will come to know and love Jesus and all generations will experience God's grace.

Mark 16 When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. 2 And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. 3 They had been saying to one another, “Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?” 4 When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. 5 As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. 6 But he said to them, “Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. 7 But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.” 8 So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them, and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid

Roof Replacement Project Meetings

During our Annual Congregation Meeting on January 28, 2024, the Roof Task Force explained to Members that a portion of the roof needs replacement this coming summer.

Bids for the roof were sent to 4 roofing contractors the last week of February. The Roof Task Force has reviewed the bids, interviewed the 2 most qualified contractors and is now ready to make a recommendation to the Congregation.

To keep Members informed of the bids, funding for the project and answer questions, we have set April 14 as an informational meeting. The meeting will be held right after the 9:30 service in the Family room. **This is a very important issue, so we urge you to attend this informational meeting.**

On April 21 there will be a **Special Congregational Meeting** for you to vote on accepting the recommended Contractor and funding of the project, so we can complete the roofing project this summer.

As a reminder we must have a minimum of 50 voting Members at the April 21 meeting.

Single-use plastics have become one of the most urgent environmental threats; they often end up buried in landfills or dumped in water sources. 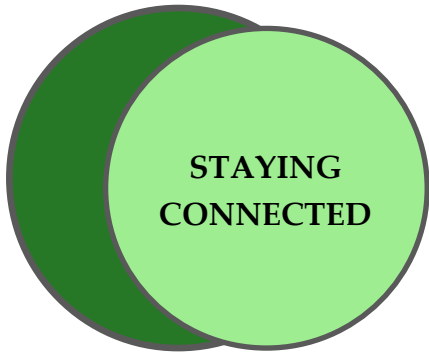

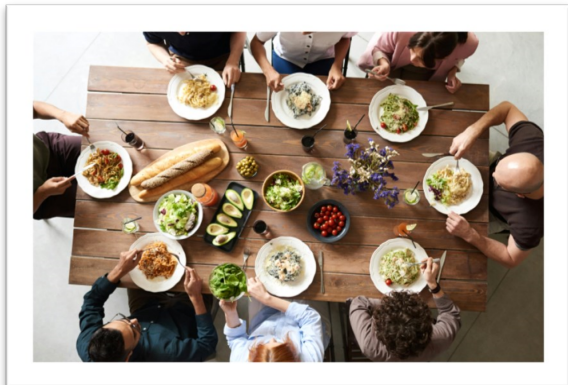

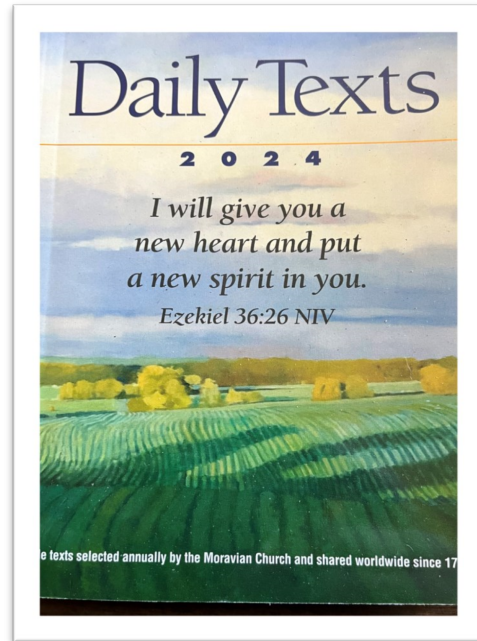


LET'S HAVE DINNER

As we travel thru life, we encounter obstacles that we must deal with. Some are small, some are insignificant, and then there are some that are life changing.

I am a Christian and strive to live a life that would please my savior.

On February 23rd, my life took a dramatic turn. I was rushed to Spooner Hospital gasping for breath. After some initial tests, the doctor on call stated that I needed to be air-lifted to Essentia Health in Duluth.

30 minutes later, I was informed that I had 2 large blood clots in the lungs, a collapsed right lung, and a right ventricle in distress. This was a direct result of my ankle surgery two weeks before. I had surgery the next day to have the clots removed. My surgeon spoke to me after surgery stating that the size of my clots typically are seen only in autopsies.

Here is where my gratitude started. When being wheeled out to the chopper, I asked God if it was his will to take me home, I was ready, but inwardly I had so much more to do. While in surgery, I felt the presence of God. He held my hand and guided the surgeons hands. The silence was like a great old time hymn.

I didn't see a white light, but the light touch of Gods hand was a greater indication that I still have more to do. On behalf of Cindy and myself we want to thank all Trinity members for your thoughts and prayers and get well cards. I am humbled by your outpouring of support and may God bless all of you each and everyday.

**The Holy Spirit and Advocate of Truth:
An Eight Week Small Group Study (Spring 2024)**

Week 1. (Apr 7) Heart (725 passages = 576 OT + 49 Gospels + 100 rest of NT)

Week 2. (Apr 14) Soul (95 passages in OT & NT)

Week 3. (Apr 21) Spirit and Impure Spirit(s) (111 NT passages)

Week 4. (Apr 28) Demons (82 NT passages) Angels (290 passages = 108 OT + 182 NT)

Week 5. (May 5) Heart and Soul (30 passages) Heart and Spirit (32 passages)

Week 6. (May 12) Spirit in the Old Testament (193 passages)

Week 7. (May 19) Holy Spirit in the Gospels (54 passages)

Week 8. (May 26) Holy Spirit in the rest of NT (100 passages)

Closing Session (June 2)

The heart is most referenced in the Bible and appears to be the primary arena where action and contention occur ... where important choices are made (week 1).

The soul (week 2) seems to be the long-term repository or reservoir of the results of conflicts in the heart between good and bad (positive and negative) spirits or demons (weeks 3-4).

Scripture reveals the paired relationships among heart, soul, spirit, body and mind, suggesting that the body and mind tend to be secondary followers of the choices the heart makes, which either bind the soul more closely to spirit or separate it further from spirit (week 5).

How the Holy Spirit and Advocate of Truth impacts these transactions between heart, soul, body and mind (good and bad spirits), is at the center of the study (weeks 5-8).

In this study, we find that the heart seems to be the primary and critical arena of contention. Impure spirits and demons seek to influence our hearts, and the Spirit of God, the Holy Spirit, seeks to inform and redeem those same hearts. If the heart is the arena, the primary field of contention, what relation do choices of the heart have in relation to our soul, to our spirit? What treasure and trash does our heart send to our soul and spirit? What is our soul and how is it different from our spirit? How does the Holy Spirit seek to operate upon these aspects of ourselves? Such questions are the ones we take up in this study with you. We took all the passages in scripture with the word for each aspect, highlighted the key meaningful phrases across all passages, deleted duplication, and arranged the phrases into an organized "condensed version" of a few paragraphs, for each weekly focus. All of the verses for each aspect (heart, soul, spirit, demon, angels, Holy Spirit, etc.) are gathered separately in appendices.

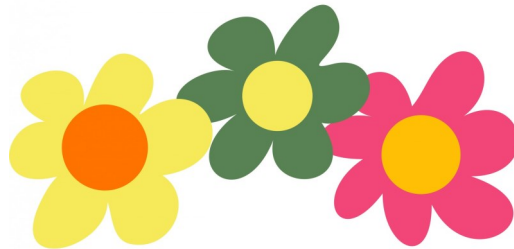

TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING: FEBRUARY 3, 2024

Members Present: Bev Bohac, Gary Hagler, Gail Lynum, Lindsay Meyer, Ann Peterson, Pat Reijo, Jean Reimann, Laura Siwicki, Pastor Heather Kistner

The Council meeting was called to order at 10:25 a.m. by Council President Pat Reijo.

President Reijo gave an overview of the relevant parts of the Trinity Lutheran Church constitution that concerned the officers, boards, and committees of the Church. It was previously decided each committee/team under the direction of each board would elect one or two people to be on the Board that oversees those Committees. For example: The Board of Trustees has the Property Committee, Finance Advisory Committee, and Decorating Committee under their guidance; and each of these committees would have one or two voting members on the Board of Trustees under the direction of Gary Hagler and Gail Lynum.

The Secretary's report from the January 8, 2024 Council meeting was provided at the meeting. A motion was made by Gail Lynum and seconded by Lindsay Meyer to approve the report as presented. Motion passed without negative vote.

There was no financial report provided for the meeting as bookkeeper Peter Donlan had not had time to compile the financials for January since the meeting was held early in the month. Treasurer Gary Hagler gave an overview of how the financial report is put together as a summary of the bookwork done by Peter Donlan. The February report will be emailed to members once it is compiled and the Council will vote via email on its acceptance.

Pastor Heather Kistner gave an overview of the Life of Faith Initiative Group that is working to connect Trinity Lutheran Church congregation to the community. In 2024 the team will begin to meet with congregation members in a variety of settings.

Lindsay Meyer gave an update on the National Youth Gathering being held in July 2024. The group has raised \$4,000 towards the next required payment and are on track to meet their fundraising goals. Upcoming fundraising events include an Easter Brunch and a Talent Show and Pie Auction in April.

Board members reviewed their discussion from the Listening Sessions held earlier during the Organizational Meeting. Member Gail Lynum brought up a concern brought to him on the church being a safe space and the possibility of having "no smoking" and "no firearm" signs in the building. Gary Hagler informed the Board that County Road K will be getting resurfaced in 2025 and encouraged Council members with questions on the roof project to contact Steve Aschbacher.

The meeting closed with members joining hands and reciting the Lord's Prayer. A motion was made by Gail Lynum and seconded by Jean Reimann to adjourn the meeting at 11:08 a.m. The next meeting will be on March 11, 2024 at 6:00 p.m. with Pastor Heather Kistner leading the devotional.

COMMENTS FOR GENERAL OPERATING FUND

Trinity Bells funding received to-date thru February is \$13,504 with \$10,000 expensed for the bells purchase.

National Youth Gathering funds received to-date is \$13,108 with \$7,961 expensed toward the trip.

Unrestricted funds balance in our General fund is \$37,377.

Unrestricted funds balance in our Building Fund (previously Capital Fund) is \$17,821.
